Its 2 am Saturday morning, February 24<sup>th</sup>, I'm 20 miles West of San Clemente, and I'm very tired and cold.

As often happens at KHYC, you start talking to people about their boating experiences over drinks and the next thing you know you're doing a double handed race around Bishop Rock. That is what happened to me this year. KHYC members David Bew, V/C James Lee, Zafar Kahn, and Xavier Menendez often regaled Joe Bell and me with stories of intrepid fortitude in the PSSA distance racing, and I was apparently inebriated enough to say "Hold my beer". This resulted in Joe and I racing from MDR, south for 100 miles to round the Bishop Rock buoy at Cortez Bank, and turn back north to the finish line at Eagle Rock on the West End of Catalina. We had already tried to race the PSSA Ship Rock race but quit after drifting around Ship rock for 2 hours. This time, we were determined to stick it out, and we did! 36 hours after the start, we finished at 3:15 am on Sunday, for a surprising 2<sup>nd</sup> place in the double handed fleet. Success!

Meanwhile, the "normal" racing has started rolling here in the Santa Monica Bay, with our own Spin #1 happening on March 16th, and a pair of Berger-Steins in the books. Berger Stein (DRYC) #2, the "South Bay Tour", was one to remember, with wind hitting 35 knots and multiple squalls bashing the fleet during the race. It's always fun to visit other clubs to see how others live, eat, and celebrate. It was great to see them in high spirits, despite a tear or two from speakers when referencing their tragic fire of the fall. We're all hoping to see them find a path forward for a new lease and a new building. Del Rey Yacht Club was also fun. They have a lovely building and a well-attended event. The Staff Commodore who gave the invocation had us all in stitches as he led a prayer for low diesel fuel costs and slip fees. I'm grateful to DRYC for the invitation, and for their kindness in renting us their Shultz's Landing facility in Cat Harbor, Catalina for our Commodore's Cruise on June 28-30. DRYC just recently renewed their lease with the Island Company. They expressed their desire to create collaborative events with other clubs, so we're going to welcome any DRYC members who are on the island to join us for our events for the Commodore's Cruise. If you meet a DRYC member, please say "thank you". Our own Opening Day is coming up fast on April 7th. We're going to throw a great event to make us all proud, see you there! Race season has begun! And, among other things, it requires race marks!

That's a lot more involved than it appears while racing. I want to express the club's appreciation to Jeff Chambers, who has been building and deploying marks for a few years. He has recently helped me to gain a better understanding of the complexities of marks maintenance.

It seems that our beloved ocean is pretty hard on them, sometimes just chewing on them and sometimes it simply swallows them whole! Marks must float, of course, and heavy ground tackle helps to keep them in place, but if it is too heavy it is hard to handle, it damages the committee boat and it could hurt the crews deploying the marks. It is a delicate task to be performed with experienced crew. If the marks bounce along toward the canyon during a very heavy storm, the heavy ground tackle simply takes them to the bottom, to oblivion!

Many of you have noticed and commented on the dredging in the harbor. Turns out it has been interrupted by equipment failure. Unfortunately, it appears that their return will likely put the dredging equipment at our end of the harbor, delaying our plan to get the rigging docks back in the water for Opening Day.

In march we reviewed "Lady Tan's Circle of Women" by Lisa See. One of our favorite local authors. The first chapter was tough for me to read. I have never under- upcoming reviews: stood the Chinese custom of folding and "binding their women's feet. Why in the world would you do that?!

> "Chánzú, or foot-binding, was the Chinese custom of breaking and tightly binding the feet of young girls to change their shape and size. Feet altered by foot-binding were known as lotus feet and the shoes made for them were known as lotus shoes. In late imperial China, bound feet were considered a status symbol and a mark of feminine beauty. However, foot-binding was a painful practice that limited the mobility of women and resulted in lifelong disabilities. The practice may have originated among court dancers during the Five Dynasties and Ten King-

doms period in 10th-century China and it has been estimated that by the 19th century 40 to 50% of all Chinese women may have had bound feet, rising to almost 100% in upper-class Han Chinese women. By 2007, only a small handful of elderly Chinese women whose feet had been bound were still alive". Wikipedia.

The book said that "According to Confucius, an educated woman is a worthless woman," but Yunxian born into an elite family, was raised by her grandparents to be of use. Her grandmother was one of only a handful of female doctors in China, and she taught Yunxian the pillars of Chinese medicine: The Four Examinations of looking, listening, touching, and asking. "Something a man could never do with a female patient in China".

From a young age, Yunxian learned about women's illnesses alongside a young midwife-intraining, Meiling (many of which relate to childbearing). The two girls found fast friendship and a mutual purpose - despite the prohibition that a doctor should never touch blood while a midwife comes in frequent contact with it - and they yow to be forever friends, sharing in each other's joys and struggles. No mud, no lotus, they tell themselves: from adversity beauty can bloom. But when Yunxian is sent into an arranged marriage, her mother-in-law forbids her from seeing Meiling and from helping the women and girls in the household. Yunxian was to act like a proper wife: Embroider bound-foot slippers, recite poetry, give birthsons, and stay forever within the walls of the family compound, The Garden of Fragrant Delights.

# PADDLE FLEET by:Donna and Gary Sofia


